

- The Changing Face of Hartford Hartford's population is becoming more diverse every year. Approximately 2,500 new immigrants from 93 countries have enrolled in city schools in the past three years. - A Mosque Grows on Franklin Avenue Most immigrant groups that have come to Hartford have followed a familiar path, be they Italian, Dominican or Jamaican. - Unevent-Full Month July was a quiet month at the Hartford Civic Center. In fact, it was dead silent. - Mixed Signals City WiFi Battles Bumps, Budget Overruns Although it targeted just two Hartford neighborhoods, the city's wireless test program has already encountered snags and slipped over its planned budget. - **City Tax Plan Resolves Nothing** The City Council recently passed a resolution forming a task force to study Hartford's property tax mess and fix it. - **Talking Trash** City Council member Bob Painter is nearly alone in his embrace of a new technology to get rid of garbage, but he remains convinced the plasma arc is the future of trash disposal. - Learning A New Career Ebbie Parsons III was recently selected by the Los Angeles-based Broad Foundation to be part of a program that trains business executives to work in the nation's neediest urban public school districts. - River Life: Peace, Pain From February to August, 2007, The Courant visited a couple of friends living outdoors along the Connecticut River twenty-five times to hear their stories. - **Music On The Move** New England Music at 470 Prospect Ave. is one of thousands of small businesses that call Hartford home. But in October, New England Music plans to move to West Hartford. One reason for the move: A new landlord has raised the store's rent twice in 18 months, said David Henry, the owner of New England Music. - Don't Replace Civic Center, Says Panel A new sports and entertainment arena replacing the Civic Center would be difficult to finance and not be in Hartford's best interest, a 10-member visiting panel of experts in urban development said recently. - Little Airport That Could The Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association the world's largest pilots group originally planned to hold its 2007 convention in Atlantic City. Hartford's shiny new convention center made it a contender. But it was the state-owned Brainard Airport that helped seal the deal. - **Museum Plans Slipped Away** The Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art's plans for a \$15 million expansion into the former Hartford Times building appear to be all but dead, the victim of financial and institutional pressures. - **Comment Raises Eyebrows** Hartford Superintendent of Schools Steven Adamowski told state officials recently that "there is no research to suggest that minority students will do better by sitting next to a white student." The comment prompted a sharp response from desegregation advocates. - Hartford's Hive of Busy Workers In 2005, the metropolitan areas of San Antonio, Austin and Hartford had roughly the same economic output. But in terms of productivity per person, the Hartford metropolitan area, with 1.2 million people beat the other two. Go to <u>www.hartfordinfo.org</u>
