Investing in our schools is paying off! The 2009-2010 school year promises to build on the positive momentum Hartford students have achieved. As many of you know, I made our children's education one of my top priorities and served as Chairman of the Board of Education for more than 3 years. I am proud of that commitment and even more proud of the progress we have made together.

Test scores are up 2 years in a row! Connecticut Mastery Tests (CMT) and Connecticut Academic Performance Tests (CAPT) improved significantly

 continuing our efforts to close the Achievement Gap and make our kids more competitive for colleges and jobs. I want to give a special shout out to Dwight Elementary School for showing the biggest improvement.

Here's something else to cheer about: 2 newly constructed schools are open – University High School for Science and Engineering and Kinsella Magnet School for the Performing Arts. We're providing our young people with a positive learning environment and we've created more than 200 construction jobs for Hartford residents who earned more than \$2 million in wages on these projects.

All Aboard the Griffin Line! Hartford leaders support commuter rail and have for more than a decade. This freight line runs from Union Station Downtown, along Blue Hills Avenue, to Windsor. Investing in rail means more jobs, easier commutes, and better connects Hartford to New Haven, Springfield, and Bradley International Airport.



STIMULUS DOLLARS AT WORK!

Hartford received \$4.2 million in Federal COPS funding to hire 23 more police officers. It is encouraging that some stimulus money is being distributed directly to urban "Main Streets." Hartford is eligible for more than \$300 million in Federal Stimulus Grants. Meantime, the City is stimulating its own Arts and Heritage Economy with \$1.1 million to create 350 employment opportunities.

VETERANS: Please note that you may be eligible for an exemption on your taxes. You must have served at least 90 days and during a period of war. To qualify, you must file your DD214 discharge papers with the Town and City Clerk prior to October 1st. Disabled Veterans must also file a disability rating sheet with the Assessors Office.
