Straight Budget Talk

As we look ahead to a new season and a new year, we must take to heart the phrase that so eloquently defines the city seal of our government – "After the Clouds... the Sun." There is hope

in these difficult times. I assure you that I am bringing everyone to the table to overcome the financial challenges that face us.

Hartford has taken decisive action to maintain a balanced budget and keep our fiscal house in order. We continue to reduce spending and enhance revenues. Every department, with the exception of police officers, firefighters, and emergency services personnel, is doing more with less while providing essential services. We are also working to achieve savings through reducing energy costs and looking to sell assets.

These decisions are not easy. 132 non-public safety positions were eliminated by not filling vacancies, offering an early-retirement incentive, and sadly, through layoffs. These are not just numbers, these are people we know and work with. I wish we could have avoided this because it is the last thing any city leader wishes to do. However, we have a duty to our taxpayers and residents to meet financial challenges head on.

This is a national financial crisis that calls for tough decisions, creative solutions, bold leadership, and clear vision. We need to work together to find new ways to reduce costs in city government and best utilize taxpayer dollars. That is why, I look to you. I encourage you to log on to www.hartford.gov and click on "Budget Survey" located in the box called "About Hartford" so that we can achieve the results together.

While we navigate through this challenging budget, I want you to know that Congress has authorized an initial grant of \$2.8 million. Our Department of Development Services will implement these funds to have the best possible impact and reduce foreclosures and the negative effects this financial crisis could have on our neighborhoods. I am also hopeful under an Obama Administration, Hartford will see more progressive investments to help our communities thrive and prosper.

Everything we can do together, we will. **Remember, "After the Clouds... the Sun."**

Public Safety is reaching new heights now that Hartford's Mounted Patrol Division has returned! Four officers and their horses are now part of the City's Neighborhood Policing Plan and are used in everything from search and rescue efforts to community outreach.

Enforcing the City's curfew works! Parents and caregivers know where their children are at 9:00 p.m. – home and getting ready for the next school day! During a 60-day concentrated enforcement, there were 157 written warnings and only 4 repeat offenders who were summoned to Community Court.

Strong investment in Hartford! Sims Metal Management Aerospace has signed a long-term lease to occupy the entire former ADVO building in the North Meadows neighborhood retaining the company's 130 jobs in the city. This company is the world's largest full service recycler of metals and electronics. It, along with Winstanley Enterprises, also entered into an agreement on the adjacent parcel of land located at 219 West Service Road. Winstanley will construct and Sims Metal Management Aerospace will lease an additional 145,000 square foot warehouse facility at this location. As Mayor, I am proud of this announcement because it is a great investment for Hartford in regards to jobs, the environment, and our future. This is the kind of investment that demonstrates great promise for the Capital City, the region, and the state.
