


Federal Study


PL 108-94 (2003) authorized the National Park Service to study whether the Coltsville Historic Industrial District, in Hartford, CT, meets congressional criteria for designation as a unit of the National Park system.



Map of Coltsville, Hartford, CT













Significance of Coltsville


- Colt Armory, built in 1855, became one of the most advanced precision manufacturing factories of the 19th and early 20th centuries.
- Colt Company played a leading role in arming U.S. military from Mexican War through Vietnam War.
- The Colt revolvers were some of the best-known products of their day.
- Coltsville was a model industrial community.





Suitability

- History of American industry has varied themes & stories, some of which are not adequately represented in the NPS system
- Coltsville interprets NPS themes of "Developing the American Economy" and "Expanding Science & Technology"
- Coltsville provides unique opportunity to interpret firearms industry, precision technology, entrepreneurship, & urban industrial community life





Feasibility

Because of evolving situation regarding development plans at the Colt factory complex and lack of public access to interior spaces, study concludes that the feasibility criterion for establishing national park unit at Coltsville cannot be met under the present circumstances.

It is possible that, as ownership issues are resolved, development plans crystallized, and partnerships better established, that feasibility criterion could be met in future.






Need for NPS Management

As with feasibility criterion, it is impossible at this time to determine need for NPS management exists. NPS is unable to determine what resources would actually be managed and protected by the NPS and what level of visitor services may be required.

Until feasibility issues are resolved, criterion for NPS management cannot be met.
