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I. Executive Summary

On January 30, 2008 communities across Connecticut conducted their second statewide count of homeless individuals and families. Building upon a similar count in 2007, *CT Counts 2008* relied on non-profits, local and state government agencies, and hundreds of concerned citizens from every region of the state to gather critical data about homeless adults and children in Connecticut. The data will be used to inform efforts to end homelessness and to help service providers and policy makers to better understand the needs of homeless people.

Collecting reliable baseline data is essential to understanding the causes of homelessness and to designing effective interventions to help homeless people rebuild their lives. Now in its second year, *CT Counts* will be an annual effort to collect data utilizing a consistent and rigorous methodology. With logistical, technical, and training support from Connecticut's twelve Continuums of Care, the Reaching Home Campaign (an initiative of the Partnership for Strong Communities), the Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness, the Corporation for Supportive Housing, the Center for Urban Community Services Housing Resource Center (CUCS) and the University of Pennsylvania Cartographic Modeling Lab, *CT Counts 2008* mobilized hundreds of agencies and individuals to gather data about the number and needs of the people who experienced homelessness on a single night. The following is a summary of key findings from the effort:

- An estimated 3,444 households experienced homelessness on the night of January 30, 2008. Of those, 2,257 single adults and 474 families with minor children, and 519 adult members of those families resided in emergency shelter or transitional housing programs and 590 single adults and 8 families resided on the streets, in parks, cars, transportation terminals, or other locations not intended for human habitation. 873 homeless children were counted along with their families. Twelve children were counted in unsheltered locations and 861 in emergency shelters and transitional housing programs.
- No unaccompanied youth were counted in unsheltered locations and 119 were counted in sheltered locations.
- Among sheltered single adults, males represented 72% of those counted with females representing 27%. By contrast, among sheltered adults in families, females represented 87%.
- Among the unsheltered, men comprised 73% of single adults, but only 38% of adults in families.
- While the majority of adults in sheltered families (66%) were between the ages of 22 and 39, the majority of sheltered single adults were older with 59% being between the ages of 40 and 59.

- Black or African American was reported to be the largest racial/ethnic identity among sheltered adults in families. All other groups most frequently reported their racial/ethnic identity as white.
- Long periods of homelessness were commonly reported among all groups, though families reported shorter periods than single adults. An estimated 853 chronically homeless single adults were found in sheltered and unsheltered locations across the state. Forty-seven percent of sheltered single adults and 33% percent of sheltered families reported one or more years since last having a permanent residence.
- The most commonly cited reason for leaving one's last place of residence was rent problems. Conflicts with family and friends were also common among sheltered single adults and families.
- In terms of levels of education, 47% of sheltered single adults and 61% of adults in sheltered families reported having at least a GED.
- Receipt of Food Stamps was common. Forty-four percent of sheltered single adults and 68% of sheltered adults in families reported receiving Food Stamps, compared to only 17% unsheltered single adults and 25% unsheltered adults in families.
- Besides Food Stamps, the most commonly reported sources of income were employment and Social Security among sheltered single adults and TANF and employment among sheltered families.
- Thirty-six percent of sheltered adults in families and 20% percent of sheltered single adults reported that they are currently working.
- In 91% of sheltered families either the adults or children have health insurance compared to 61% of sheltered single adults who reported that they have health insurance.
- Histories of behavioral health issues were common across all groups, with approximately one-third of sheltered and unsheltered single adults reporting a history of mental health hospitalizations; 17% of sheltered adults in families reported a history of mental health hospitalizations; in addition, 52% of sheltered single adults and 16% of adults in sheltered families reported a history of using hospital, detox, or rehab services for a substance abuse problem.
- Reports of health conditions that limit one's ability to work, get around, or otherwise take care of one's needs were also common, particularly among single adults.
- Thirteen percent of respondents overall reported that they were currently on probation, transitional supervision or parole. Compared to 16% of sheltered single adults 9% of sheltered adults in families, and 7% of unsheltered single adults. Probation status was the most commonly reported type of correctional system involvement.

- Twenty-nine percent of all beds in emergency shelters and 38% of shelter beds designated to serve families were vacant on the night of the count. In transitional housing, 10% of beds were vacant.
- Sheltered households increased by 11% in the past year. Among sheltered households, single adults increased by 6%, families increased by 21%, children in families increased by 18%
- Unsheltered households decreased in the past year by 21%, which was mainly due to the effect of discarded surveys. Among unsheltered households, single adults decreased by 17%, families decreased by 79%, children in families decreased by 83%.

II. Introduction

For the past two years, CT Counts has mobilized non-profits, local and state government agencies, and hundreds of concerned citizens from every region of the state to gather critical data to inform efforts to end homelessness. In October 2006, the Reaching Home Campaign, the Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness, and the Corporation for Supportive Housing first reached out to Center for Urban Community Services Housing Resource Center (CUCS) and the University of Pennsylvania Cartographic Modeling Lab for assistance in organizing a statewide count of homeless people. Connecticut's inaugural statewide homeless count using consistent data collection methods occurred on January 30, 2007. One year later, on January 30, 2008, communities across Connecticut conducted their second count of people living in emergency shelters, in transitional housing programs, in the woods, on the streets, and in cars or other unsheltered locations. CT Counts 2008 provides information about the number and needs of people who are homeless at a specific point in time. The data collected will help service providers and policy makers to better understand the dimensions of homelessness and help to establish, over time, a means to measure the effectiveness of initiatives to end homelessness.

Since 2003, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has required applicants for federal homeless assistance grants to report the number of people who are homeless in their communities at a particular time. HUD currently requires that communities conduct a point-in-time count during the last week of January. Collecting reliable baseline data is essential to understanding the causes of homelessness and designing effective interventions to help homeless people rebuild their lives. *CT Counts* aims to continue to collect annual data in order to better understand the dynamic causes of homelessness, to evaluate the effectiveness of programs serving homeless people and, ultimately, to track progress towards ending homelessness in Connecticut.

Throughout this report "single adult" refers to a person 18 years of age or older who is not accompanied by minor children, "unaccompanied youth" refers to a person under 18 years of age who is not accompanied by a parent or guardian, and "family" refers to a household of two or more people that includes minor children. This report uses the HUD definition of homelessness which includes only people who fit one of the following descriptions at the time of the count: an unsheltered homeless person resided in a place not meant for human habitation, such as cars, parks, sidewalks, abandoned buildings, or on the street; a sheltered homeless person resided in an emergency shelter or transitional housing for homeless persons who originally came from the streets or emergency shelters.

III. Data Collection Methodology

With assistance and technical support from CUCS and the University of Pennsylvania Cartographic Modeling Lab, the Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness, convened a team of dedicated representatives from Connecticut's twelve Continuums of Care. Included among the twelve Continuums was the Balance of State, which for the purposes of the unsheltered count was disaggregated into 10 distinct regions¹. The count organizers drew heavily from the experience, expertise, and networks already developed by the Continuums through their participation in *CT Counts 2007* and previous local counts. The count organizers worked with the continuum representatives to apply lessons learned during 2007 and modify the 2008 methodology accordingly. Ultimately, the methodology for *CT Counts 2008* was very similar to that used in 2007. That methodology included three key components:

- a sampling strategy devised by the research team to estimate the number of unsheltered homeless people throughout the State;
- a count conducted by the State's emergency shelter and transitional housing providers of the people staying in their programs;
- an anonymous survey of sheltered and unsheltered single adults, unaccompanied youth and adults in families.

The count organizers originally designed the survey instruments for *CT Counts* 2007 through a collaborative process drawing on the expertise of researchers from the University of Pennsylvania, statewide organizations, and local service providers. Surveys collected detailed information about demographics, prior living arrangements, length and causation of homelessness, income, disability, health, and parental status. In 2008, survey instruments were revised and updated. Differences between the 2007 and 2008 survey include: the addition of a question about whether the respondent is homeless with a spouse, partner or significant other; the addition of a question to elicit detail regarding the location where unsheltered respondents slept on the night of the count; the addition of questions aimed at excluding from the count of unsheltered families households who did not have children under 18 living with them in an unsheltered location;

¹ HUD requires applicants for federal homeless assistance grants to develop a community plan to organize and deliver housing and services to meet the specific needs of people who are homeless in their communities. The plans are typically developed by a collaborative of non-profit and government agencies, private foundations, concerned citizens, and homeless people. Those collaboratives are known as "Continuums of Care." For the purposes of the CT Counts 2008 unsheltered count methodology, in 2008, the Balance of State (BOS) Continuum which coordinates homeless assistance in areas of the state not covered by another Continuum was disaggregated into a total of 10 areas: Hartford East, Hartford North, Hartford West, Litchfield, Manchester, Meriden, New Haven East, New Haven North and South, New Haven West, Tolland, and Windham.

addition of a question regarding probation, parole and transitional supervision status. The survey instruments used are included in Appendices O and P of this report.

As in 2007, fully canvassing the more than 5,000 square miles within the State of Connecticut was not feasible, and the 2008 methodology again relied on the extensive knowledge of the state's non-profit and public sector homeless services agencies to determine in which areas unsheltered homeless people would most likely be found. The research team developed detailed maps of every area in the State and determined in which Continuum of Care each area was located. In total, the team mapped 2617 block groups across the state of Connecticut.

In order to determine the probability that unsheltered homeless people would be found in each area, the State's twelve distinct Continuums of Care consulted with key informants, including outreach teams, soup kitchens, homeless people, service providers, police/sheriff departments, and local government agencies. Using that information, Continuums assigned a "density rating" to each census tract or block group based on the probability of finding people living in locations not meant for human habitation on the night of the count. A Very Low density rating signified that canvassers would be likely to find no more than 1 person in unsheltered conditions; a Low density signified a low likelihood of finding 2 or more people in unsheltered conditions; a High density rating signified a high likelihood of finding 2 or more people in unsheltered conditions; and a Certain density rating signified that canvassers would be certain to find 2 or more people in unsheltered conditions (Table 1).

Teams were instructed to fully canvass all block groups rated as Certain. Teams also were instructed to fully canvass areas rated as High. With the exception of the Bridgeport/Stratford and Stamford/Greenwich Continuums of Care, among Low density areas with 100 or fewer block groups, Continuums were instructed to canvass 35% of the areas. Low density areas with more than 100 block groups were to canvass 15% of the areas. Among Extremely Low density areas with 100 or fewer block groups, Continuums were instructed to canvass 30% of the areas. Extremely Low density areas with 100 or more block groups were instructed to canvass 35% of the areas (Table 2).

To ensure rigorous fidelity to the sampling methodology, the research team selected which areas would be canvassed. In choosing the block groups to be canvassed, the team used a web-based randomization calculator (random.org) to assign the block groups to be included in the sample.

In total, 43%, or 1120, of the total 2,617 block groups, were to be canvassed (Table 3). Draft maps detailing each of the randomly chosen block groups were provided for review to the Continuums of Care. Finalized copies of each of the maps were provided to the enumerators in advance of the night of the count (See Appendix N for a sample map).

To minimize the possibility of double counting and increase the validity of the final results, the Count was held across the State of Connecticut on January 30, 2008 from 7pm to 11pm². To avoid duplication, teams were also assigned to cover unique study areas, volunteers were identified by large buttons, and interviewers asked each person who completed a survey whether he or she had already been interviewed.

The research team trained representatives from CCEH and from each Continuum on how to administer surveys and complete other count forms. To respond to concerns raised last year, regarding the accessibility of centralized training and to maximize training participation, CCEH and the Continuums then conducted a series of local trainings for agencies participating in the sheltered count, as well as for the unsheltered count volunteers. The training curriculum offered guidance on identifying unsheltered homeless people, e.g., volunteers were advised to enter public places where homeless people may seek comfort, such as train and bus stations, airports, laundromats, and libraries. Trainers urged volunteers not to rely on judgments about what homeless people look like and to approach as many people as practicable to conduct an interview and determine who is homeless. In circumstances in which many people were present and approaching everyone was not practicable, trainers offered guidance on detecting signs that a person might be homeless.

In addition, count organizers instructed trainees not to trespass on private property, and volunteers were urged to use their judgment and not canvass areas that they believed to be unsafe. For example, volunteers may not have canvassed areas including abandoned buildings, remote wooded areas, alleys, areas under overpasses/bridges and areas along train tracks. Volunteers were instructed not to wake sleeping individuals and not to attempt to survey anyone who was agitated. Volunteers were further advised to read each survey question exactly as written, not to interpret questions, and to re-read or skip questions as needed. If at any point the person being interviewed expressed a wish not to continue, volunteers were instructed to terminate the interview. Where available, volunteers were also provided with instructions on accessing shelter services for unsheltered homeless people.

Except in New Haven, where a large sample size was predicted based on past counts and teams conducted interviews with every second person, all regions attempted to interview every homeless adult and unaccompanied youth encountered. Volunteers in New Haven used a tally sheet to capture via observation basic demographic data about individuals that were not interviewed. The tally sheet is included in Appendix Q of this report. Other regions used the survey form to record basic visible demographic data for people they were unable to interview.

Each emergency shelter and transitional housing program serving homeless people in the state of Connecticut also counted the number of adults, families and children staying in their programs on the night of January 30th. Programs recorded that data on forms provided by count organizers. To improve data accuracy, the research team developed a web-based form that Continuums of Care could use to submit sheltered count data. Although paper forms were still acceptable, use of the web-based form was strongly encouraged. The web-based survey collected identical data to that collected on paper forms, which are included in Appendix R of this report.

Based on an analysis of 2007 sheltered count data, the research team devised the following sampling strategy for the administration of surveys to people in shelter and transitional programs: programs with 40 or fewer adults on the night of the count administered the survey to every adult, and programs with 41 or more adults interviewed every second adult (50%). Programs that interviewed only 50% of clients, selected participants by creating a random numbered list of all adults staying at the program on the night of the count then interviewed every second person on that list.

IV. Data Analysis

The research team entered all data submitted on paper forms and uploaded data submitted through the web-based survey into an Access database. Only data for people meeting the HUD definition of homelessness³ were analyzed (see page 16 for a discussion of related limitations). HUD definitions were also used to categorize household types either as single adult or family.⁴ Illegible and inconsistent client survey data were discarded, and the research team and/or Continuum of Care leaders contacted programs as needed to attempt to obtain usable data for sheltered client population counts.

In circumstances in which sheltered client survey or other available data could be used to approximate missing sheltered population counts, the research team used those data. For example, for family programs that reported only the number of adults residing in the program, the team applied an average family size based on available data to estimate the number of children– the multiplier used was 1.81 children per family.

The data were analyzed and are presented in this report both on a statewide basis and grouped by the following twelve Continuums of Care: Balance of State⁵, Bridgeport/Stratford/Fairfield, Bristol, Greater Danbury, Hartford, Middletown/Middlesex County, New Britain, New Haven, Norwalk-Fairfield County, Norwich/New London City, Stamford/Greenwich, and Waterbury⁶.

The data contained in Appendices A-M were obtained from surveys conducted with sheltered and unsheltered adults and unaccompanied youth. CUCS used available survey data for each Continuum of Care to estimate the number of people reported in each data element. For each Continuum, we calculated the prevalence of each survey response then applied that rate to the total number of people.

In addition, to provide estimates of the number of unsheltered people among the non-sampled block groups (i.e. block groups that were designated as Certain, High, or Low but were not among those randomly selected to be canvassed), the

³ The HUD definition of homelessness includes only people who reside in one of these places at the time of the count: an unsheltered homeless person resides in a place not meant for human habitation, such as cars, parks, sidewalks, abandoned buildings, or on the street, and a sheltered homeless person resides in an emergency shelter or transitional housing for homeless persons who originally came from the streets or emergency shelters.

⁴ According to the HUD definition, a family must include 2 or more related persons at least one of who is a child under 18. HUD defines singles as persons not accompanied by children under 18, including pregnant women not accompanied by other children, unaccompanied youth, and couples not accompanied by children under 18.

research team employed a basic imputation strategy. For each non-sampled block group, the team used the mean count of homeless people found in the Low density canvassed area in the Continuum of Care in which the block group is found as the imputed value. We then multiplied that average by the number of non-sampled block groups.⁷

⁷ Two factors guided our decision to use the average from the Low density areas to impute the values for the non-sampled block groups: A priori, the Continuums of Care had identified and sampled all known Certain/High block groups, so it was unlikely that additional Certain/High block groups would be found among the non-sampled block groups. Moreover, post hoc, the Continuums of Care generally did not interview as many people across the Certain/High canvassed block groups as had been anticipated. We therefore reasoned that the Low density canvassed block groups provided the best information that we could use impute the number of people we would expect to find among the non-sampled block groups.

V. Limitations and Caveats

The authors recognize the challenges inherent in any attempt to count homeless people, including but not limited to controversy surrounding the definition of homelessness; the difficulty of determining who meets the chosen definition; the logistical challenges of canvassing a large area in a short period of time; the possibility of duplication (i.e. counting people more than once); the difficulty of finding homeless people who may be well-hidden, particularly in bad weather; the volatility of programs' participation between years; and the limitations of estimating the prevalence of various characteristics among the homeless population. Furthermore, CT Counts 2008 did not use quality assurance mechanisms to assess the accuracy of the count or to determine the proportion of un-surveyed people.

Consistent with HUD guidelines and the CT Counts 2007 methodology, CT Counts 2008 attempted only to enumerate those individuals and families who are literally homeless, that is those who are living in emergency shelters or transitional housing programs for homeless people and those who are sleeping in places not meant for human habitation such as streets, parks, and other public places. The effort did not attempt to count those who are precariously housed, such as people who are living temporarily with friends or family, those in overcrowded or substandard housing, or those who are paying extremely high proportions of their resources towards rent. CT Counts 2008 also did not count residents of transitional housing programs that are not specifically designated for homeless people. For example, residents of mental health, substance abuse, and child welfare programs were only counted if the program specifically serves homeless people.

As in 2007, CT Counts 2008 discarded those surveys that did not meet the HUD definition of homelessness. One particular change to the survey instrument in 2008, likely resulted in more surveys being excluded, i.e., in 2007 respondents were asked about the specific location where they slept the night prior to the count and, in 2008, data was collected regarding the specific location where unsheltered respondents slept on the night of the count. As a result, in 2008, 189 respondents who cited sheltered locations (e.g., living with a friend or family or in a substance abuse treatment facility) were excluded from the count. It is notable that on 53 of the discarded unsheltered surveys, the respondent provided a response that indicated homelessness in a sheltered location (i.e. sleeping at an emergency shelter or transitional housing for homeless people); however, since the count methodology called for sheltered count data collection via other means, to avoid duplication, the authors discarded data regarding sheltered people submitted through unsheltered surveys.

It is likely that the aforementioned change to the survey instrument resulted in an overall reduction of the unsheltered sample size in 2008. This reduction may be particularly significant in specific Continuums of Care or localities. For example, among 189 unsheltered surveys discarded, 92 were from Litchfield County located in the Balance of State Continuum. The change likely reduced the estimate of the total unsheltered homeless population in Litchfield County by approximately 50% from 2007 results. The authors believe that such difference between years is less likely due to and thus should not be interpreted as a fundamental change in the homeless population in that area.

In addition, due to a relatively high number (n=38) of unsheltered homeless families found in the 2007 count, the 2008 survey was revised to collect additional data regarding unsheltered families. That data was used to exclude families whose children did not meet the HUD definition for homelessness. For example, if a respondent reported children who were staying with a relative at the time of the count, that respondent was counted as a single adult and the children were excluded from the count. These changes likely resulted in a significant decrease in the number of unsheltered families counted. The authors believe that the decrease in unsheltered families from 2007 to 2008 is less likely due to and should not be interpreted as a fundamental change in the homeless population. Furthermore, due to the small sample size of unsheltered families (n=8), the authors caution against drawing conclusions regarding unsheltered families based on the survey data contained in this report.

Inherent difficulties in counting certain subpopulations of unsheltered homeless people including youth, undocumented immigrants, and families with minor children, make it likely that the data contained in this report represent an undercount of those groups. Homeless youth under age 18, for example, are likely not to be readily visible to volunteer enumerators because they commonly desire to remain undetected by child welfare and criminal justice authorities and are susceptible to violence on the streets.

Rather than fully canvassing every area of the State, CT Counts 2007 and 2008 used a statistically reliable sampling methodology to arrive at statewide estimates of the number of unsheltered homeless people in the State of Connecticut. The reliability of those estimates is impacted by the accuracy of the density ratings assigned by Continuums of Care. The results listed in Table 5 suggest substantive differences between the actual and expected block group density distributions. For example, among the four Continuums of Care that initially identified 10 or more block groups as Certain to have 2 or more homeless people, none found people within more than half the block groups (Table 5). Similarly, the number of homeless people observed among the identified High density block groups was 76% lower than expected by the sample design (Table 5). Whatever the reasons that may have contributed to the gap between the

actual and expected block group distributions – including refusals, no one present in the areas, language problems, or the limited window of time for canvassing the areas, since the Continuums expected to conduct the majority of the interviews among people within the Certain and High density block groups, these two possible sources of error alone appear to have artificially deflated response rates by reducing the likelihood of contact with people in the areas.

As a result of limited time, new questions on the survey instrument were not field tested, which might lead to a failure to capture accurate data. For instance, a new question designed to enumerate the number of unsheltered couples without minor children, did not rule out the possibility that the person's spouse or partner was also interviewed during the count. Therefore, to avoid potential double counting, the research team did not include the number of couples in the total unsheltered homeless population estimate.

In addition, the authors note that errors generated in administering the count likely negatively impacted data accuracy. For example, given the difficulty of administering a fairly lengthy survey under suboptimal conditions (i.e., on the street in the dark) misunderstandings regarding the survey questions can be expected. In addition, at least one Continuum used unsheltered surveys to gather data in sheltered settings and several used unsheltered tally sheets in addition to unsheltered surveys. Furthermore, sheltered count data sometimes lacked inner logic (e.g., a program may have reported sheltering 4 families but only 1 child) and incomplete forms were submitted (e.g., unsheltered surveys without block group numbers). While data cleaning and ongoing communication with local count coordinators helped to ameliorate data quality issues, the authors acknowledge that such solutions are not entirely accurate and could not resolve all issues. To increase data quality in 2008, the research team introduced a web-based form that could be used to submit sheltered count data; however, more than two-thirds of programs used paper forms.

Also, CT Counts 2008 relied heavily on volunteers to consistently complete challenging tasks such as canvassing large areas on a cold night, traveling to remote areas, approaching strangers, and attempting to interview every person encountered in areas that are heavily trafficked. The organizers also prioritized volunteer safety, and it is likely that people living in remote and or inaccessible locations perceived as unsafe by volunteers were not counted. In addition, in circumstances in which interviews of each person encountered were not practicable, or, in the case of New Haven, were not called for by the methodology, the count relied on volunteers' determinations about who is homeless.

When selecting the time of the count, organizers juggled several competing needs, such as volunteer recruitment and safety, sufficient time to cover all study areas, and minimization of duplication. The Danbury, Stamford and BOS-Litchfield Continuums of Care decided that the selected time was inconsistent with local needs and conducted their count at an alternative time resulting in a greater possibility of duplication (e.g. a person could be counted by one Continuum on the street during the day and again by another Continuum in a shelter at night). To protect against duplication, enumerators asked all sheltered and unsheltered survey participants if they had already been interviewed by someone wearing a CT Counts 2008 button, and anyone who responded affirmatively was removed from the sample.

Additional limitations relate to competing demands on the time of program staff. The count of sheltered homeless people relied heavily on program staff to complete forms in accordance with the count methodology. Staff whose primary responsibility is to the well-being of clients and the efficiency of program operations, likely faced other priorities for their time. These demands may have interfered with their ability to provide accurate and comprehensive data.

The authors acknowledge that lack of participation by some programs also diminished data accuracy in the sheltered count. There were eleven programs that, based on last year's inventory, submitted neither count forms nor sheltered client survey data in 2008. For example, the Veterans Administration in Rocky Hill did not participate in the 2008, which potentially diminished the total estimate of veterans in the final results. Similarly, the authors note that new participation by programs and program expansions affect the count results and caution against unfounded conclusions regarding growth in certain sheltered homeless populations. For example, in 2008, one agency serving unaccompanied youth reported a bed expansion in a program that participate in the 2007 count and an additional program serving youth that did not participate in 2007.

Moreover, the highly decentralized nature of homeless service programs across the State present an ongoing challenge to the administration of a consistent count methodology. Given the limitations described above and significant differences among the CT Counts 2008 methodology and count methodologies used prior to 2007, the authors caution against comparisons. CT Counts 2008 built upon the 2007 count methodology and represents another step forward towards developing a consistent and reliable methodology; however, the authors view the results as preliminary and caution against drawing conclusions that can not be supported by the data, especially given the caveats and limitations Furthermore, the authors recognize that continued data described here. collection at regular intervals will be necessary to understand the dynamic causes of homelessness, to evaluate the effectiveness of programs serving homeless and, ultimately, to track progress towards ending homelessness in people Connecticut.

VI. Results

The estimates derived from CT Counts 2008 indicate that a total of 3,444 households experienced homelessness on the night of January 30, 2008. Of those, 2,257 single adults and 481 families with minor children resided in emergency shelters or transitional housing programs, and 590 single adults and 8 families with minor children resided on the streets, in parks, cars, transportation terminals, or other locations not intended for human habitation. Eight hundred and seventy-three (873) homeless children were counted along with their families, and of those only 12 were found in unsheltered locations with the remainder residing at emergency shelters and transitional housing programs.

One hundred and nineteen (119) unaccompanied youth were counted in sheltered locations, and no unaccompanied youth were found in unsheltered locations (see section V. for a discussion of the difficulties of enumerating unsheltered youth). Table 6 shows the total number of sheltered and unsheltered families and single adults throughout the State and in each Continuum of Care⁸. The tables contained in Appendices A through N show data gathered through surveys of sheltered and unsheltered homeless people, including demographic data; data describing housing and homeless history, education, employment, and benefits history data; and data describing special needs among surveyed homeless individuals.

The largest number of sheltered homeless households were counted at programs located within the Hartford (n=773) and New Haven (n=556) Continuums of Care. Together the households residing in these two regions represented 47% percent of the total number of sheltered homeless households counted. These two regions sheltered both the greatest number of single adults (Hartford n=549, New Haven n=471) and the greatest number of families (Hartford n=110, New Haven n=85) (Table 6). Unsheltered households in three Continuums accounted for 60% of Statewide totals (Balance of State n=183, New Haven n=92, and Middletown-Middlesex n=85,). The number of unsheltered homeless families was low (n=8, Table 6). A total of twelve unsheltered children were counted with their families in the regions represented by the Balance of State, Bridgeport/Stratford/Fairfield, Middletown/Middlesex County, New Haven, and Stamford/Greenwich Continuums of Care (see Section V for a discussion of limitations and caveats related to the unsheltered family count).

The survey sought data regarding the location of respondents' last place of permanent residence. Among sheltered single adults, the most commonly reported towns were also New Haven (11%, n=250), Hartford (11%, n=258), and Bridgeport (6%, n=131). Among sheltered adults in families, the most commonly reported towns were also New Haven (15%, n=72), Hartford (8%, n=38) and Bridgeport (7%, n=34). About 1% of households reported an out-of-state location. (Appendix A, Table A2).

Among sheltered single adults, males represented 72% of those counted (n=1,620) and females 27% (n=602). By contrast among sheltered adults in families, females represented 87% (n=411). Among the unsheltered, men comprised 73% of single adults (n=431) and 38% (n=3) of adults in families (Appendix A, Table A1).

While 66% percent of adults in sheltered families were between the ages of 22 and 39 (n=313), the majority of sheltered single adults were older with 59% being between the ages of 40 and 59 (n=1,326). While sheltered adults in families most frequently reported their racial/ethnic identity as Black or African American (n=182, 38%), all other groups most frequently reported their identity as white. Forty-three percent of sheltered single adults (n=964), 28% of unsheltered single adults (n=167), and 50% of unsheltered adults in families (n=4) reported white as their racial identity (Appendix A, Table A1).

The vast majority of sheltered households (81%, n=1,823 of single adults and 89%, n=422 of adults in families) reported that they had also resided at either an emergency shelter or transitional housing program the previous night. Among those who were unsheltered on the night of the count, the number of respondents who reported a sleeping location other than "Non-housing", "Other" or "Unkown" is zero (0), since such responses disqualified them from inclusion in the unsheltered count and those records were thus were pulled from the final analysis. Shelters and transitional housing programs were also the most commonly reported locations where both sheltered single adults and adults in families stayed during the thirty days prior to the count. The unsheltered most frequently reported non-housing locations, such as streets, parks, cars, bus stations, parking garages, campgrounds, woods, and abandoned buildings, and living with family and friends as the places they had resided during the thirty days prior to the count (Appendix A, Table A2).

Long periods of homelessness were commonly reported among all groups, though families reported shorter periods than single adults. Among single adults, forty-seven percent of sheltered respondents (n=1,076) and twenty-four percent (n=143) of unsheltered respondents reported 1 or more years since last having a permanent residence. In total, 853 (30%) of single adults met the HUD

definition of chronic homelessness.⁹ Among sheltered adults in families the majority reported less than one year since they last had a permanent residence (60%, n=286).

The most commonly specified reason across all categories for leaving one's last place of residence was rent problems. Conflicts with family and friends were also common among sheltered single adults and families (Appendix A, Table A2). Except for sheltered adults in families, relatively few respondents cited domestic violence as the reason they left their last permanent place of residence. Reported levels of educational attainment were higher among sheltered than unsheltered people. Forty-seven percent of sheltered single adults (n=1,067) and 61% of sheltered adults in families (n=287) completed at least a GED compared to 22% of unsheltered singles (n=130). Fifteen percent of sheltered (n=349) and 9% unsheltered single adults (n=54) reported that they had served in the military (Appendix A, Table A3).

Receipt of Food Stamps was common. Forty-four percent of sheltered single adults (n=985) and 68% sheltered adults in families (n=320) reported receiving Food Stamps, compared to only 17% unsheltered single adults (n=100) and 25% unsheltered adults in families (n=2). Without the consideration of Food Stamps, the most commonly reported income source across all groups are Social Security, Work and TANF. Sheltered single adults reported significantly higher rates of Social Security Income (17%, n=384) than either unsheltered single adults (5%, n=27) or families (sheltered families: 7%, n=3; unsheltered families: 12%, n=1). Sheltered adults in families reported significantly higher rates of TANF (35%, n=165) and employment (34%, n=163) than sheltered single adults (TANF, 1%, n=21; employment, 17%, n=388), or unsheltered single adults (TANF, 0%; employment 6%, n=34). (Appendix A, Table A3).

Histories of behavioral health issues were common across all groups, with approximately one-third of sheltered and unsheltered single adults reporting a history of mental health hospitalizations. Thirty-seven percent of sheltered (n=837) and 33% of unsheltered (n=194) single adults reported a psychiatric hospitalization as did 17% of sheltered (n=81) adults in families. Histories of

⁹ Under the HUD definition, a person who is "chronically homeless" is an unaccompanied homeless individual with a disabling condition who has either been continuously homeless for a year or more OR has had at least four (4) episodes of homelessness in the past three (3) years. In order to be considered chronically homeless, a person must have been sleeping in a place not meant for human habitation (e.g., living on the streets) and/or in an emergency homeless shelter.

treatment for substance abuse were significantly less common among sheltered adults in families. Fifty-two of sheltered single adults and approximately 60% percent of unsheltered adults reported a history of using hospital, detox, or rehab services for a substance abuse problem, while 16% of sheltered adults in families reported such use.

Respondents commonly testified to health conditions that limit their ability to work, get around, or otherwise take care of their needs. Fifty percent of unsheltered single adults (n=297), 41% of sheltered single adults (n=915), 40% of unsheltered adults in families (n=3), and 17% of sheltered adults in families (n=82) reported a limiting health condition (Appendix A, Table A4). Despite common reports of psychiatric hospitalizations, use of inpatient substance abuse treatment and limiting health conditions, survey respondents tended to assess their overall health positively, though unsheltered respondents tended to report lower health ratings. On a scale of one to six with one being the worst and six being the best health rating, 77% of sheltered adults in families (n=368), 62% of sheltered single adults (n=1,382), 23% of unsheltered single adults (n=139), 24% of unsheltered adults (n=2) in families rated their health at four or better. (Appendix A, Table A4).

Thirteen percent of respondents overall reported that they were currently on probation, transitional supervision or parole. Compared to 16% of sheltered single adults 9% of sheltered adults in families, and 7% of unsheltered single adults. Probation status was the most commonly reported type of correctional system involvement, with 11% for sheltered overall and 7% for unsheltered single adults. Among all sheltered respondents currently on probation, transitional supervision or parole, 69% were male and 31% were female. Among all unsheltered respondents currently on probation or parole, 76% were male and 24% were female.

New Haven (sheltered single adults n=92, adults in families n=5) and Hartford (sheltered single adults n=79, adults in families n=7) accounted for 47% of sheltered single adults and 28% of sheltered adults in families who were currently on probation, transitional supervision or parole. Four unsheltered clients in New Haven reported they were currently on probation, transitional supervision or parole, and no client in Hartford reported so.

A comparison between 2007 and 2008 count data (Table 7a) shows that overall the number of sheltered households increased by 11% (n=2846, Δ n=281) in the past year. Single adults increased by 6% (n=2257, Δ n=119), families increased by 21% (n=474, Δ n=82), children in families increased by 18% (n=861, Δ n=133) and unaccompanied youth increased by 240% (n=119, Δ n=84). An analysis of the data revealed the growth of unaccompanied youth was due to data reported by two new programs designated for unaccompanied youth in the Hartford Continuum of Care (See section V). The two Continuums with the greatest growth in sheltered households were Hartford with an increase of 52% (n=773, Δ n=266) and Bridgeport/Stratford/Fairfield with a 44% increase (n=216, Δ n=66), while Waterbury and Balance of State accounted for the two largest decreases, with 32% (n=67, Δ n=-31) and 23% (n=294, Δ n=-89) respectively.

A comparison between 2007 and 2008 data (Table 7b) shows that overall unsheltered households decreased in the past year by 21% (n=598, Δ n=-162). Single adults decreased by 17% (n=590, Δ n=-117), families decreased by 79% (n=8, Δ n=-30), children in families decreased by 83% (n=12, Δ n=-57) and unaccompanied youth decreased by 100% (n=0, Δ n=-15). However, it should be noted that 189 unsheltered surveys were discarded in 2008, 92 of which were from Litchfield County (see Section V for additional details). If those data were included in the analysis, the change in number of unsheltered households would have been insignificant. As noted in Section V the decrease in unsheltered families can be largely attributed to changes in the survey instrument that reduced the possibility of errors in data collection. It is also notable that no Continuum of Care reported unsheltered unaccompanied youth in this year's Count, and that there was no significant change in the number or rate of chronic homelessness among single adults from 2007 to 2008.

A comparison of bed capacity to occupancy data revealed that 29% of all beds in emergency shelters and 38% of shelter beds designated to serve families were vacant on the night of the count (Table 8a). In transitional housing, 10% of beds were vacant (Table 8b). In addition, overall emergency shelter occupancy rates in five Continuums of Care were below 70% (69% in Bridgeport-Stratford, Norwich-New London, and Stamford-Greenwich, 60% in Balance of State, and 56% in Waterbury, Table 8a)¹⁰.

VII. – Conclusions/Implications

Data from CT Counts 2008 are consistent with and support the findings of the 2007 effort. The CT Counts 2008 estimate for the number of people living in unsheltered conditions suggest that Connecticut continues to have a significant street homelessness problem, particularly in the New Haven, Middletown/Middlesex County, and Balance of State Continuums. Communities may be led to believe that this is a shelter capacity problem; however, they should be cautioned that this is not necessarily the case. First, an analysis in the Balance of State Continuum in 2007 and 2008 revealed both available capacity on the night of the count and a significant unsheltered population. On the night of the 2008 count, the occupancy rate at emergency shelters in the Balance of State Continuum was 60% overall, 80% in beds designated for singles, and 42% in beds designated for families. Second, some unsheltered persons make a choice to avoid shelters and will do so even if more capacity is created. Shelters may be perceived as violating a persons' sense of dignity, or persons may have had direct experiences with the shelters that discourage them from returning. In any case, research has shown that individuals prefer safe-havens and various other "housing first" models and that these methods are more effective in providing stabilization opportunities¹¹. Given that such housing options may create more permanent solutions to homelessness, these may represent a better investment strategy than expansions of shelter capacity.

Analysis of program occupancy rates at emergency shelter programs reveal significant vacancies particularly in the Balance of State, Bridgeport-Stratford-Fairfield, Norwich-New London, Stamford-Greenwich and Waterbury Continuums¹². This finding, which is based on point-in-time data, should be balanced with other available data, including the Department of Social Services shelter utilization report, which indicates a 91% shelter utilization rate for the month of January. As communities across Connecticut work to end homelessness, additional analysis of program occupancy rates over time, may reveal opportunities to reinvest resources in interventions like supportive housing, rental supports, and prevention. But such decisions have to be made in the context of localities' overall strategy for balancing emergency, transitional and permanent housing resources.

Data tracked by the Connecticut Department of Social Services also indicate that a significant number of families requesting shelter are turned away. The authors note that families seeking shelter may be turned away despite available bed capacity for reasons including a mismatch between the number of family members and the number of beds available at a particular shelter.

The 2008 data again reveal a high proportion of disabilities, especially among persons with long-term homelessness and among the street homeless, which suggests that supportive housing models must be a significant part of the solution of reducing homelessness in CT. In fact, an estimated 853 chronically homeless disabled single adults¹³ were found in sheltered and unsheltered locations on the night of the 2008 count and the rate of chronic homelessness remained relatively stable from 2007 to 2008. These findings suggest that to address the current need, CT's supportive housing capacity would have to increase. Although new persons will accrue into eligibility as long-term homeless, creation of a sufficient supply should at some point establish enough housing vacancies through unit turnover to accommodate new cases. As Connecticut continues to develop new supportive housing capacity, the data contained in this report and additional analysis of the population and capacity data gathered through CT Counts 2007 and 2008 can help to inform statewide development plans (e.g. the Reaching Home Campaign Plan) and could also prove useful to planning efforts in local communities.

Given that the estimate revealed in both 2007 and 2008 that more than one quarter of homeless people are located in areas that are predominantly rural and suburban¹⁴, program planners should continue to develop supportive housing units throughout the state and avoid concentration in urban areas alone. To maximize community integration and minimize stigma for supportive housing residents, projects should be consistent with the type and scale of the local housing stock.

For persons in homeless families, the results again indicate that most families are not homeless for longer than one year nor for as long as is reported by the single adults. Unlike among the singles, the majority of adults in families do not report having behavioral health problems. In addition, 63% of adults in families reported having no significant disability. Together, these findings support the conclusion of last year's study that many families can be housed and remain housed with some level of income support. Income supports could vary from relocation grants, to transitional (timelimited) rental assistance, to long-term subsidies. Ideally, supports should be designed to fit the varying profiles of the families, and the varying availability of affordable housing by region in the state. It is a policy matter to determine how to best pay for these supports, including use of federal housing assistance, state housing funds or public assistance grant mechanisms. Varying lengths of assistance can likely be supported by the different sources, and program planners may choose to allocate those resources accordingly.

At the time of the survey about 37% of families had at least one significant disability. Over the course of a year, it is likely that several times as many families impacted by a

disability will experience homelessness (future HMIS data are needed to establish annual prevalence). For families who have disabilities or more intensive support needs, policymakers should consider combining services packages with rental assistance.

In the case of either families with disabilities or without, the number of families who experience homelessness in a year, while significant, may represent a population for whom prevention alternatives could be considered. The Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness is currently leading efforts to formulate a policy initiative to address homelessness among families. Particularly given the disruptive impact of homelessness on children and families, thoughtful policy experiments in this area might be considered.

CT's homeless population is largely consistent with the profile of the homeless in the United States. Most are single adults, half of whom have a behavioral health disability and half of whom have been homeless for longer than one year. The singles are also mostly male, and aging. Families are younger, have much lower levels of disability, and are homeless for shorter periods. In both cases, they represent the profiles of the people who are among the neediest in the state – young children and disabled adults. Ending homelessness in CT will require efforts designed to reach these populations and, with sufficient targeting, is within reach. But continuous monitoring and counting will also be required to assure that interventions are working and reducing homelessness in the state.

VIII. Considerations for the Future

As communities across Connecticut begin to plan future collaborative efforts to count sheltered and unsheltered homeless people, the authors offer the following recommendations for building upon the results of *CT Counts 2008*:

Conduct additional analysis of the data currently available. The data gathered through *CT Counts 2007 & 2008* are a source of valuable information about the scope and dimensions of homelessness in every community throughout the state of Connecticut. Additional data analysis would likely provide important insights that could inform efforts to end homelessness. For example, point-in-time population and program inventory data could be used to project need for housing-based interventions, such as long and short-term rental assistance, transitional housing, and permanent supportive housing. Additional analysis of occupancy rates at programs throughout the state could help to inform need projections and assessments of whether any programs are currently underused. In addition, analysis of population data by locality could be helpful for local service planning and program development purposes as could an analysis of demographics and special needs among various subpopulations.

Implement a quality assurance strategy to assess the accuracy of the unsheltered count and determine the proportion of people who are missed.

The authors suggest that the plant-capture and/or next day survey technique be used in the future. The plant-capture method places mock homeless people, also known as "plants" or "decoys", in systematic locations throughout the study area and then tracks how many of the plants are found. The next day survey technique uses visits to programs frequented by homeless people who may not use shelters (e.g. soup kitchens, drop-in centers, and mobile food vans) to gather information about where service recipients stayed on the night of the count and whether that location would have been visible to enumerators. The survey can also gather useful information about locations frequented by homeless people to incorporate in future counts. With both methods, final estimates can be adjusted for the rate of undercounting observed.

Increase utilization of existing and implement new quality assurance strategies for the sheltered count. Expanding use of web-based forms will reduce submission of incomplete or illogical data and data entry errors and eliminate the need to discard illegible data. Also, additional review of count data prior to submission by local count coordinators who are familiar with programs in their communities, will help to detect and correct data quality problems. In addition, competing demands on program staff time may have a negative impact on data quality. In order to minimize the impact, consider recruiting students who, on the night of the count, could be dedicated to ensuring that count forms are completed accurately and submitted promptly. Depending on program size and location, students could be assigned to

cover multiple programs. To help ensure data integrity, students should be thoroughly trained and sufficiently compensated.

Eliminate inconsistencies in the count methodology. Continue to work well in advance of the count with local count coordinators from every region to assess local needs, problem solve local concerns, and develop a commitment to a standardized statewide methodology for the count. Use a consistent time period to minimize the likelihood of duplication and avoid local changes to the standardized count forms.

Work with the Continuums of Care to strengthen density predictions. Work with the local count coordinators to understand the reasons why pre-count density designations differed from density results. Consider pre-screening study areas before finalizing density ratings and again as close as possible to the actual count to better understand how use patterns change over time and at different hours, to identify hidden areas enumerators might miss, and to clarify confusing area boundaries. Pre-screening study areas can also provide a useful opportunity to field test all count surveys and forms.

Identify strategies to locate and enumerate unsheltered youth. Homeless minor youth are likely not to be readily visible to volunteer enumerators because they commonly desire to remain undetected by child welfare and criminal justice authorities and are susceptible to violence on the streets; therefore, strategies to identify unsheltered youth should be explored.


