



Town of Berlin Workforce Profile

Located 12 miles south-southwest of Hartford, the Town of Berlin has a land area of 26 square miles and is home to 19,032 residents.

Berlin's population is comprised of 93% whites, 1% Blacks, 2% Hispanics and 4% Other/Multi-Race individuals.







The town's median age is 42. The age distribution is demonstrated in the pie chart to the left.

Of Berlin residents age 25+, 13% do not have a high school diploma, 48% possess a diploma or some college, and 39% have earned an Associate's degree or higher (State: 16%, 46% and 38% respectively).

The 2003 cumulative dropout rate was 17.1% (up almost 10% from previous year) and 85.3% of graduates pursue post-secondary education (down 1.7%).





Thirty-six (36) percent of Berlin's population 16+ function at literacy levels one and two (out of five levels, level five being the highest). Individuals at levels one or two would <u>not</u> be able to read an ATM screen, decipher a bus schedule, read a newspaper, read the dosage on a medicine bottle, or fill out a job application.
