



City of New Britain Workforce Profile

The City of New Britain is located 9 miles southwest of Hartford, has a land area of 13.3 square miles and is home to 72,395 residents.

New Britain's population is comprised of 55% Whites, 8% Blacks, 22% Hispanics, and 15% Other/Multi-Race individuals.







New Britain's median age is 35. The age distribution is demonstrated in the pie chart to the left.

Of New Britain residents age 25+, 31% do not have a high school diploma, 47% possess a diploma or some college, and 22% have earned an Associate's degree or higher (State: 16%, 46%, and 38% respectively).

The 2003 cumulative dropout rate was 23.7% (down 4.9% from the previous year) and 78.8% of graduates pursue post-secondary education (down 0.1%).





Fifty-six (56) percent of New Britain's population 16 and over function at literacy levels one and two (out of five levels, level five being the highest). Individuals at levels one or two would not be able to read an ATM screen, decipher a bus schedule, read a newspaper, read the dosage on a medicine bottle, or fill out a job application.
